Tour

Thursday June 13

The Tour will be Thursday, June 13th at 10:00 am. We will go to San Francisco and have a guided tour of attractions including historic downtown Market Street, which we will see pre-earthquake in the video during Rich Pryor's talk, the Wharf, Ferry Building, Victorian Homes of Alamo Square, and the Golden Gate Bridge. As San Francisco is a peninsula, we'll visit the Bay, the Pacific Ocean and the Golden Gate all in one tour, with many points of interest along the way.

We will tour the historic Palace of the Legion of Honor, which was built by Alma Spreckels, wife of sugar magnate Adolph Spreckels, as a memorial to the 3,600 California men who lost their lives on the battlefields of France in World War I. The stipulation was "to honor the dead while serving the living," which allowed the building to be accepted by the City of San Francisco as a museum of fine arts. Our tour group will have lunch at their leisure in the Museum Cafe and tour the collections, including special admission to Impressionists On The Water, a curated exhibit featuring artworks from the Musée d'Orsay, the Van Gogh Museum, and the J. Paul Getty Museum, along with privately held works from around the world. Our return trip will take us through more of San Francisco and its astounding views.

The cost of the tour will be \$50. Lunch is on your own and is not included in the cost. Transportation will be by chartered bus round trip from the hotel.

EXHIBITIONS

There will be a broad spectrum of items exhibited at the conference drawn from the collections of the California members of HCIF. Pieces for Tiffany, Bailey Banks & Biddle, and our own Shreve and Company will complement designs by both Dammouse brothers, Jules Habert-Dys, Merlot, Bracquemond and others. Rare early pieces from the 1879 catalog will mix with high Victorian design and spectacular large pieces that would not otherwise make it out of California. Tablescapes will include a French Dinner Service circa 1870 and elaborate table settings by Dick Osterberg. The French Dinner Service, which went out of style in the middle of the 19th century, was an elaborate affair where all of the dishes were ornamented and presented in three distinct services: Soup and Fish, Game and Meat, and Salads and Sweets. All of the elements of the course were placed in the center of the table, and diners availed themselves of the dishes that were near them, or if they had a footman, asked them to procure distant victuals. The service did not have the specialized oyster plates or asparagus plates of later Victorian dining, but did require a huge number of serving pieces for all of the different items to be presented. Dick Osterberg will draw from his vast collection of crystal and silver to complement Haviland table settings in ever-popular patterns, and talk about arranging places with coordinating elements of color and design. Items to support the talks will include pre-Earthquake Haviland, a broad selection of variations of Schleiger 77, rare backmarks, and dozens of variations of Schleiger 52.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE AREA

Being such an optimal spot for natural resources, the Bay Area was settled early by Native Americans of several different backgrounds that founded villages along the peninsula and along the Golden Gate. Collectively they were known as the Ohlone, and their trade of the bay's riches connected them with tribes as far away as Baja, Yosemite and the Mohave Desert. The Europeans arrived in 1769, and were primarily Spanish exploring the coast up from Mexico. The Presidio of San Francisco, still surviving today as a National Park, was the military outpost, and religious interests founded the Mission San Francisco de Asis, also known as Mission Dolores because of its nearness to a creek named after Our Lady of Sorrows. The original name of the city was Yerba Buena after a beneficial herb that grew in abundance throughout the region, but later in 1847, with its inclusion into the United States, the city took its name from the mission as many did along the coast, and has been known as San Francisco ever since.

US Navy Commodore John D. Sloat claimed California for the United States on July 7, 1846, during the Mexican-American War. Little did he know of the turmoil that was to occur just a few years later with the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill. During the two years beginning in January 1848, the population of San Francisco increased from 1,000 to 25,000, and continued to grow exponentially with the discovery of the Comstock Lode of silver in 1859. San Francisco was the largest city west of the Mississippi until it ceded that title to Los Angeles in 1920. The enterprises that grew from the Gold Rush were fueled by a large immigrant population, mostly from China, and the Chinese community has contributed richly to the culture of San Francisco, including a thriving Chinatown that still today is one of the largest in the country.

The gold and silver mining companies and other resources of the Bay Area founded many famous brands including Levi Strauss, Ghirardelli chocolate, Wells Fargo and Crocker banks, and the fortunes of the Big 4: Charles Crocker, Mark Hopkins, Collis Huntington and Leland Stanford. The Mark Hopkins and Huntington Hotels on Nob Hill were built on the ashes of their personal mansions after the Earthquake of 1906. San Francisco was the "Paris of the West" and routinely entertained the best of society and culture from around the world. Mark Twain, Bret Harte, Rudyard Kipling, Robert Louis Stevenson and Oscar Wilde spent time in the city. Enrico Caruso was singing at the Opera House at the time of the Earthquake. The city was only partially damaged by the earthquake itself, but the ensuing fire engulfed large swaths of what is now downtown and south of Market. Consequently, there are many beautiful Victorian homes still existing in many parts of the city, but the downtown area is largely new and experienced growth spurts in the decade following the earthquake, the late 1970s and early 1980s with the inclusion of many large notable landmark buildings, and the 2000s with its broad renovations South of Market.

In order to demonstrate its resurgence after the Earthquake, San Francisco hosted the Panama Pacific Exposition of 1915, and some of the "temporary" buildings still exist today. The Summer of Love counterculture event originated in the Haight district of San Francisco, and the city was a center of rock and alternative music for several decades afterwards. Many followers came to hear the music and participate in the events and have stayed, but gentrification has turned the surrounding areas of the Haight into rows of multimillion-dollar Victorians, each one more elaborate than the last.

Today, the city is part of the technology hub that ranges from San Francisco to the north and San Jose to the south. Many startups and their hopeful pre-NYSE debut employees live and work in the burgeoning South of Market area, with its resplendent new ballpark for the Giants and sprawling University of California campus. San Francisco is central to many attractions in the Bay Area and beyond. To the North, Muir Woods features an ancient redwood forest and offers tours. Just beyond is the wine country, with day excursions possible to Napa and Sonoma, although both are worth a extra day or two at least. Further north lies the Mendocino coastlands and Sea Ranch, a planned community along the water, that rents homes by the day or week for vacationers looking for a little peace and quiet.

The East Bay features the University of California along with several museums and countless famous restaurants including Chez Panisse. The Claremont is a spectacular Victorian resort nestled in the hillside overlooking Oakland and the Bay, and is a great spot to spend a few days recovering from the excitement of the conference. Beyond that, Sacramento is a two hour drive and features a ceramics museum and the State Capitol. Those wishing to hit the casinos of Lake Tahoe's South Shore can expect a 7-9 hour drive, but the views are beautiful along the way and the destination is thrilling. To the South, Silicon Valley beckons, with its own museums and exciting nightlife. Along the coast a couple hours south are Monterey and Santa Cruz, each with their own attractions. Pebble Beach will excite those that like to play golf and shop for expensive knickknacks. Carmel boasts quiet resort hotels with some of the best dining in California. For those looking for an extravagant tour, Hearst Castle is just a bit farther down the coast. There are endless things to see and do in and around San Francisco, only limited by your imagination.
